 How many birds can I see and name? What are some local Indigenous names for these birds?
- Nature Painting

 How can I create my own paint using natural materials?
- Build a shelter

 How can I make a gunyah? What materials will I need?
- Star Gaze
 Once the stars are out, can I name any constellations? Can I find the Emu in the Sky?
- 6 Animal tracks
 Using my observation skills, can I find evidence of wildlife in the area? What tracks can I find?
- Weather

 Can I describe the weather? What are some seasonal indicators I might be able to see, smell, or hear?
- S Get moving

 Can I mimic the movements of my favourite Australian animals?
- 9 Outdoor picnic
 Enjoy a special outdoors meal. Can 1 spot any bush foods?
- Heal Country
 With help from a grown up, can I clean up my outdoor space? Clearing rubbish from country cares for our land and waters and keeps habitat healthy for plants and animals.
